


# LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENT

# GROWTH AND NEW HORIZONS

This report summarizes the work completed between **April 2023 and March 2024**. This year was a year of tremendous growth and impact for YCCBC. In the summer of 2023, YCCBC completed the Kamloops YCC program and the Kwakwaka'wakw Revitalization Project, both of which showcased the impact of this program when partnered with a local government and Indigenous community. In the fall of 2023, YCCBC started the YCC Vancouver program which was six months long and involved engagement with a diversity of partners and projects.

The year was capped off by excellent news from the Province of BC, who announced in their budget that they are investing \$3 million over three years into YCCBC to expand youth involvement in climate action projects. This investment will allow YCCBC to expand its impact by serving more youth and communities across BC. As we continue to expand our work across BC we look forward to continuing our partnerships with all levels of governments, First Nations, and environmental and youth organizations. As we reflect on the impact of the past year, we are also looking ahead with excitement towards the future.


# ORGANIZATIONAL MISSION

# FROM INCEPTION TO IMPACT

Youth Climate Corps was started in 2020, as a program of Wildsight, a grassroots organization dedicated to protecting biodiversity and encouraging sustainable communities in Canada's Columbia and Rocky Mountain regions. In 2021, Youth Climate Corps BC was founded, and since then Wildsight and YCCBC have served over **80 youth** totalling **7,000 working days of climate action**.



# III 2023-24

#### **VANCOUVER**

Between August 2023 and March 2024, YCCBC ran a pilot program in Vancouver. The program included three young people between the ages of 17 to 30, with the title Climate Action Technicians (CAT), and a coordinator, who completed over **500 working days** of climate action.

The program would not have been possible without our dedicated partners, such as Vancouver Hastings Community Action Team HUB Vancouver, and (VHCAT), Unlimited. A main project that the team led was the development of the Climate Friendly Homes Program (CFHP), which was adopted from the Kamloops Youth Climate Corps program to serve the communities in the Metro Vancouver region. The CATs attended various networking events, and workshops, conducted presentations and completed courses which enhanced their professional development. The program provided the crew with valuable hands-on experience in various energy-efficient projects but also made a meaningful impact on the environment and the community. Looking ahead, the Youth Climate Corps Vancouver program remains committed to empowering youth whilst promoting sustainability and environmental stewardship through collaborative initiatives and partnerships.

#### **KAMLOOPS**

In the spring of 2023, YCCBC partnered with the City of Kamloops and BCHydro to create a pilot program that focused on building up the youth workforce, reducing emissions and tackling climate change. The main project developed was the Climate Friendly Homes Program, which was developed implemented through the five-month program. Between May and October 2023, a group of 4 local young people between the ages of 17 and 30 worked on climate action projects, built their workforce readiness skills and learned about civic engagement and reconciliation. The outcomes of the program include a proof of concept for the city bike valet and Climate Friendly Homes Program, engaged local youth, implementation of the Kamloops Community Climate Action Plan. With the development and promising results from the Climate Friendly Homes Program, and the ability for Youth Climate Corps BC to test future climate projects with the City of Kamloops, there are many opportunities for continuing this productive partnership.




#### **NORTH VANCOUVER ISLAND**

YCCBC collaborated with the Kwakwaka'wakw Revitalization Project (KRP) to implement a youth cultural and work camp aimed at supporting Ma'amtagila sovereignty, cultural resurgence, and skill-building Kwakwaka'wakw youth. The initiative employed six Kwakwaka'wakw youth for six weeks, during which they conducted research on traditional and knowledge within practices communities. The project featured a week-long cultural workshop and a work camp focused on constructing a tool shed at Hiladi, a previously abandoned village site now being revitalized by Ma'amtagila elders and youth. Hiladi serves as a place of healing, offering Kwakwaka'wakw youth the chance to connect with their traditional lands, engage with their peers and elders, and strengthen their cultural ties.

#### **Community and Youth-Identified Successes:**

- Engaging people with the land and fostering self-autonomy and stewardship.
- Revitalizing traditions and ceremonies, bringing life back to the land that had been dormant since the abandonment of Hiladi.
- Creating a communal atmosphere where Kwakwaka'wakw people, including youth, elders, parents, and children, came together as a supportive and welcoming village. New connections were made, and everyone felt included.
- Constructing a new toolshed and outhouse, enhancing the program's infrastructure.
- Providing reimbursement for youth, and enabling those unable to access the land previously to do so through funding for supplies and time. This support has allowed participants to connect with the land more deeply, reinforcing its cultural significance.





# YCCBC BUILDING COMMUNITY

#### YOUTH COMMITTEE

In early 2024, YCCBC launched its inaugural Youth Committee, comprising 11 individuals aged 17-30 from across BC. The committee's role is to support the strategic direction and growth of YCCBC. Members engage monthly on topics such as Indigenous Sovereignty and climate science, helping to foster a more dynamic and inclusive organization.





#### MEMBERSHIP PROGRAM

Alumni are important to the mission and goals of YCC. Continuing to offer support and opportunities to the alumni will support our mission of helping "YCC participants to improve their lives while becoming a part of something bigger than themselves." The purpose of the membership program is to allow YCC Alumni to have the opportunity to vote for board members, a chance to have a say in the future of the organization and a direct opportunity to contribute and continue to engage with YCC. This program will increase engagement, reinforce the YCC alumni community, and empower climate leaders developed through the program.

# YCCBC EXPRESSIONS NEWSLETTER

YCCBC has been able to grow our network and connections significantly in 2023 and 2024. The YCCBC newsletter's number of subscribers has growth by 230% in the last year. The average open rate is 59% (according to Campaign Monitor, a healthy email open rate can be anything from 20% - 40%). A number of 24 newsletters have been sent during the past year including the monthly newsletter.






